
The Mission Statement of St. Aloysius Catholic School

Faith Formation with Ms. DiPietro

The forty days of the Season of Lent exist so that we can prepare ourselves well to pray the three days of the Easter Triduum. The term Easter Triduum might not sound familiar to you, however, you are very

familiar with it. The Triduum is our annual three day celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Many people when asked what three days are included in the Triduum will respond: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday; clearly, four days rather than three. But the days of the Triduum are counted according to the Jewish custom of measuring days from sunset to sunset. The first day of the Triduum goes from sunset on Holy Thursday to sunset on Good Friday. The



second day begins at sunset on Good Friday and ends at sunset on Holy Saturday. The third day is counted from sunset on Holy Saturday to sunset on Easter Sunday.

To prepare for the Easter Triduum and Easter we will explore each of the three days of the Triduum in the classes and also we will be bring the classes over to the church to pray the Stations of the Cross.

Playground Safety

Playgrounds provide important opportunities for children to explore their environments, develop skills for play and gain confidence. They are also exciting places for children to be outdoors and active, and to make friends.

Despite these great benefits, playgrounds are also common places where kids get hurt. Each year, more than 220,000 children under age 14 are treated in hospital emergency rooms across the United States for injuries occurring on playgrounds.



There are several things that parents and caregivers can do to help make the playground safer for children. This includes providing strong supervision, ensuring that equipment is free of potential hazards, and steering kids to age-appropriate play areas.
